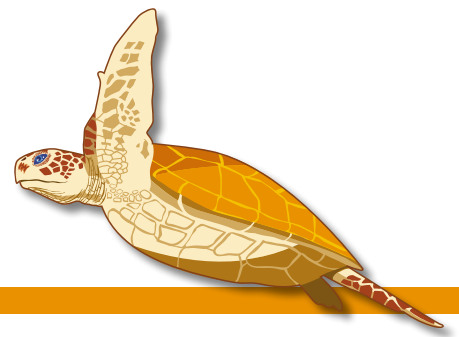




Activity sheet - Oceans

- 2 Name a fish that is in danger of disappearing through overfishing

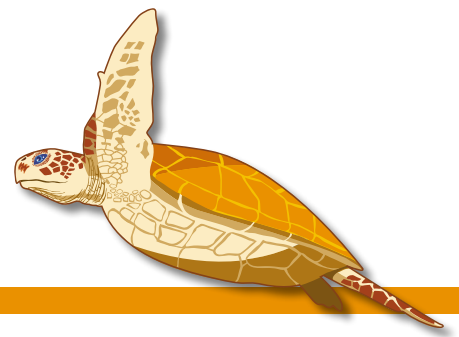
- 3 What's the label that shows fish has been caught responsibly caught?

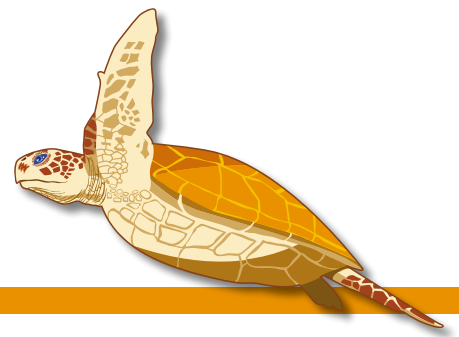
